In the second study, I examined students' uses of markers of organization (e.g. conclusion markers, transition markers) and stance (e.g. epistemic markers, engagement markers) and the relationships of these markers to overall writing quality. Again using multilevel modeling, I found that two types of emergent

organizational markers had a significant negative relationship to overall writing quality, and the total number of stance markers had a small but significant positive relationship with overall writing quality that was stronger in shorter essays. Taken together, these studies suggest that students are making many attempts to use various academic language features in their written essays, and have an emerging understanding about how to use academic language features effectively. The students' emergent efforts to use academic language features suggest the potential of explicit instruction together with frequent exposure to academic language uses to improve students' persuasive writing.
